Introduction

Country/Location: Ukraine

Title of Emergency: War- Response to Humanitarian Crisis

Dates covered by report: April 18 – April 29, 2022

Situation Report No. Ten

General overview

After two months of war (February 24 – April 26th), **5.3 million people have fled Ukraine, and around 7.7 million have been displaced internally within the country**, many of whom have no access to water and electricity.

Active fighting continued to be reported in eastern and southern Ukraine, primarily affecting eastern Donetsk, Kharkivska and Luhanska oblasts. Calls for a humanitarian pause during Orthodox Easter went unheeded, and there were reports of multiple attacks across the country striking civilian infrastructure as well as residential areas. On 23 April, missile strikes in Odesa (Odeska oblast, south) reportedly hit an apartment building, allegedly killing eight people, including a three-month-old girl, and injuring 18 others. On 25 April, there were reported missile attacks on five railway stations across Ukraine, with unconfirmed civilian casualties, in Lvivska oblast (west), Rivnenska oblast (north-west) and Vinnytska oblast (center-west).

According to the The Office of the High Commissioner for Human ¹(OHCHR), civilian casualties stand at 5,840, including 2,729 killed and 3,111 injured, even though the actual figures are expected to be much higher.

As hostilities continue to exacerbate the humanitarian crisis in Ukraine and drive displacement across borders, the UN and humanitarian partners issued the revised Flash Appeal and Regional Refugee Response Plan (RRP) on 25 April. The initial Flash Appeal, launched on 1 March to cover a period of three months, has been revised to cover an additional three months until 31 August 2022. The updated Regional Response Plan – initially prepared to cover a six-month period – now covers the period until the end of 2022.

Overview of ChildFund Response

Please refer to previous SitReps: 1-9 for activities carried out in the last few weeks.

This SitRep covers activities carried out during the period of April 18 – April 29, 2022.

ChildFund Deutschland’s Response Program- Whole Country

It should be noted that the activities carried out in this SitRep are in line with the Ukraine Regional Response Plan launched by WeWorld and ChildFund Deutschland on March 18. The Alliance Secretariat organized a second webinar in a series since the conflict started. The latest webinar held on 27 April, included updates of the situation on the ground and an overview of activities being done by three Ukrainian partner organizations.

During the period 18 April to 29 April, ChildFund Deutschland’s partner organizations undertook many activities, including the following. Please note that the activities below are not a complete overview. Two of the partner organizations could not be contacted recently; the report is only covering activities implemented by three partner organizations.

- Relief activities in Lysychansk, Region Luhansk, were terminated after a period of extreme fighting. Activists of the regional partner organizations as well as most civilians have been evacuated to Dnepr or other safer places.
- Online teaching and counselling programs for several thousand children continued country-wide, implemented by partner organization Smart Osvita.
- 100 children and 70 accompanying adults in Sumy (Region Sumy) received food, hygiene products and medical supplies.
- 500 children and 700 accompanying adults in Mykolaiv (Mykolaiv Region) received food and hygiene products as well as other basic items for daily use.
- For 30 children and 50 accompanying adults – all of them IDP – in Klesiv (Region Rivne) tentative shelters were established.
- 32 families in Lutsk (Region Volyn) received food, hygiene products and other basic items for daily use.
- 26 families in six villages in Region Zhytomyr – all of them IDP – received food, hygiene products and other items for daily use,
- 21 children and 21 accompanying adults in Novograd-Volynsky (Region Zhytomyr), living as IDP in a former Boarding School, received bed-linen (municipality is paying for their food),
- 15 children and 8 accompanying adults in four cities received individual help (baby clothing, nappies, items for daily use).

Programs (being done by ChildFund in specific sectors)

Protection

WeWorld has kicked off a 6 month emergency project funded by an Italian Local Authority together with the local implementing partner Smart Osvita. Four IDPs shelters in Lviv will be provided with Child-friendly Safe Spaces and Psychosocial Support targeting children and women.

With funding from ChildFund Deutschland, WeWorld supported 150 IDPs (women and children) to get access to the Maternity Transition Center in the Central Railway Station in Lviv City, emergency distressed mental health and recreational services in a safe space. 600 IDPs in the Municipality of Borislav and 4,750 IDPs in the supported Collective Centers received services as well.

Food and Non-Food Items

179,840 IDPs provided with humanitarian life-saving and life-sustaining NFI and food support, in particular:

- Food for children (6-59 months) in 10 IDPs Collective centers
- Hygiene Kits (for 10 IDPs Collective centers)
- Warehouse kit (for six IDPs sites)
- NFIs Kit (for 10 IDPs Collective centers): The kit has folding beds with mattresses, pillows, blankets, towels, equipment such as washing and drying machines, freezers, refrigerators, microwave ovens etc.
- Assistive devices Kit (for 10 IDPs Collective centers)
